#### POLICY/22 LAWS CHANGED

- Expanded expungement for convictions — impacts
   1.5 million Georgians
- Early termination of probation
- Driver's license suspension reform

#### PRISON SUPPORT/REENTRY

- Metro Reentry Facility (MRF)-Reentry Lawyering
- Family support



## Mass incarceration in the U.S.






\$87 billion lost in GDP when people with a record are excluded from the labor market

### RATES OF CORRECTIONAL CONTROL BY STATE




### WHICH STATES ARE THE WORST OFFENDERS?



Which states have the highest rates of incarceration, probation, and total correctional control?








# RACIAL DISPARITIES exist at every step in the process





- No equivalent disparities in actual criminal behavior
- Having a criminal record reduces likelihood of a callback for an interview by half
- Black applicants with a record suffer a penalty about twice as severe as their white counterparts

# 4.5 million with GA criminal record



**50%** were only arrested once.

over 60%
of those with a felony conviction were not sentenced to prison.

only 14% have a felony conviction.

< 2%

were convicted of a serious violent or sexual offense.

# Desistance Research:

The Effect of Time With No New Arrests

### Rearrest or Recidivism:

Most occurs within 3 years of an initial charge

Virtually all occurs within 5 years



Risk of arrest is the same as the general public



2 times as likely to avoid rearrest


## **Talent and Contribution**



- Acknowledging the unpaid labor of incarcerated individuals
- Eager to Work
  - Unemployment rate 5x general rate
  - 64% of unemployed men have at least an arrest record



John Hopkins study



- More Motivation & More Loyalty
  - Employers like Butterball Farms observed employees with records are more highly motivated and loyal
  - Harvard Military Study

# Opening Access to Occupational Licensing



- Any criminal record can be used to deny someone a license
- Procedures are limited and inconsistent

# **Expanding Access** to Expungement



- 4.5 million people with GA criminal history
- Only 2 misdemeanors can be expunged in a lifetime

# Victim-Centered Programs



 Better enable local jurisdictions to implement victimcentered programs like restorative justice
